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MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR

WE ENTERED THE PANDEMIC WITH SOME OF OUR LOWEST PER CAPITA NUMBERS IN THE PUBLIC HEALTH WORKFORCE THAT WE'VE HAD IN DECADES, IF NOT EVER.

As we now examine the current and future needs and capacity of the workforce and their communities, we can see that changes in funding and turnover among exhausted public health workers has lowered the age of the workforce in a relative heartbeat. As we've long worried about an 'aging' and too homogenous public health workforce, this influx of new and more diverse public health professionals is a wonderful change. Yet, this change brings with it a workforce with much less experience in public health and relatively fewer mentors to help people grow into their positions and develop as leaders.

NWCPHP is leaning in and doing everything we can to make the most out of this wonderfully

diverse, youthful, smart, bright, eager group so they want to stay in public health and develop their new ideas. As a new workforce brings in new ways of thinking and new connections to more diverse communities, we are eager to embrace this, learn from their lived experience, and help public health workers get what they need to succeed in their new roles. This includes evaluating our efforts, supporting public health partners in evaluation activities, and generating the data and evidence needed to assure a thriving workforce and effective public health system.

This past year we also welcomed a new cohort of scholars to our Leadership Institute. After a careful review, new training competencies were included in both to reflect the changing landscape regarding anti-racist practices in public health. The steady success of this intensive program has been evident in the need and the value that scholars, and their employers, receive – especially amidst these challenging times.

We've had some major ups and downs in the public health workforce this century, but along with our partners we're creating a new vision of what supporting that workforce can be.

TRAINING COLLABORATIVE CROSS-SECTOR EMERGING LEADERS

In 2020, we launched the Northwest Public Health & Primary Care Leadership Institute (pictured above), developed in collaboration with the Northwest Regional Primary Care Association. Since then, we have welcomed yearly cohorts of scholars from local, state, and Tribal health departments, community-based organizations, community health centers and other primary care institutions. The Leadership Institute, which centers health equity, brings together emerging leaders to develop more equitable and effective approaches to population health. Program faculty and dozens of regional leaders and advocates have presented on topics including adaptive leadership, systems thinking, change management, and healthcare transformation and system integration.

STUDENT FIELD PLACEMENT PROGRAM

To be eligible for the program, the projects must establish or strengthen the placement of students in public or nonprofit health organizations, particularly ones serving underserved areas and populations, to work on a discrete public health project. This placement should provide structured opportunities or experiences to allow the student to apply acquired knowledge and skills in a public health practice setting.



RESEARCH

SHARE-NW

For 5 years, ending in December 2022, the federal Office of Minority Health funded the SHARE-NW: Solutions in Health Analytics for Rural Equity across the Northwest project at NWCPHP to help address public health inequities in rural areas in our Northwest states (Alaska, Idaho, Oregon, and Washington). Through a multi-partner collaboration and guided by a region-wide Equity Advisory Committee, SHARE-NW's approach was to work with local and state public health leaders to increase the availability of, access to, and use of data that reflect the complex underlying social conditions that impact health in the region's rural areas. Addressing needs in these rural jurisdictions resulted in three parallel interventions. 1) linking desired data sets together with local-level indicators of a) the social determinants of health, b) existing public health resources, and c) the type and reach of current prevention services. 2) making the data easily accessible via a dahsboard, with user-friendly interfaces and functionalities for interpretation, analysis, display, and data sharing with stakeholders and other systems. 3) And providing training and organizational support to build capacity in understanding how to interpret and integrate data into decision making.

EVALUATION OF THE YOUTH-CENTERED ENVIRONMENTAL SHIFT (YES!) PROGRAM TO REDUCE SEXUAL VIOLENCE IN MIDDLE SCHOOLS

Since 2020, this CDC-funded project has supported the rigorous evaluation of the Youth-Centered Environmental Shift (YES!) Program to reduce sexual violence in Washington middle schools. In partnership with Washington's Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction, we have sought to generate evidence to guide the delivery of sexual violence prevention programming early in the adolescent life course. Through data collected among school staff, school board leaders, and others our results are contributing to national conversations and debates about how best to move forward with school-based sexual violence prevention and rigorous evaluation of these efforts.

NOTABLE CONTRIBUTIONS FROM FACULTY

9-1-1 AND YOU: PREPARING BYSTANDERS FOR EMERGENCIES

This training was the result of a collaboration between Public Health - Seattle & King County's Emergency Medical Services Division and the University of Washington School of Public Health. This three-part training covers the basics of calling 9-1-1 and the steps someone can take to recognize and respond to stroke and cardiac arrest. Each module includes practical tips and activities for sharing this life-saving information with the older adults in one's family and community, particularly those for whom English is not a primary or preferred language.

ADVANCING DATA MODERNIZATION FOR PUBLIC HEALTH

In 2022, the Washington State Department of Health, the University of Washington Department of Epidemiology, and NWCPHP began working together to advance data modernization efforts in Washington state. Specific attention was given to a gap analysis of public health infrastructure and workforce performance. The partnership aims to utilize these findings to support future data systems improvements.

COVID-19 INFORMATION NAVIGATOR

This training was developed to help linguistic and cultural bilingual volunteers who have relatives in Washington state be able to disseminate important health information to their loved ones. COVID-19 has disproportionately affected vulnerable populations all around Washington and because of this, there has been a lack of access to information for these communities. This training assists in minimizing that gap by promoting bilingual individuals to become "Information Navigators" for their own loved-ones and communities.

INTEGRATED FOOD SAFETY CENTER OF EXCELLENCE (COE)

The Washington State Department of Health and University of Washington School of Public Health were selected to establish an Integrated Food Safety Center of Excellence (CoE) in 2019. NWCPHP is honored to serve as the CoE for the Western Region, which includes Alaska, California, Hawaii, Idaho, Nevada, Oregon, Washington, and Guam.

NWCPHP serves as a regional training hub and provides instructional design, web design, and graphic design for the Washington CoE.

This joint venture combines academic and public health expertise to strengthen food-borne illness outbreak detection and response in Washington and nationwide. The Washington CoE identified food safety best practices and serves as a regional resource for training and workforce development.

The Integrated Food Safety Centers of Excellence program was established by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) under the Food Safety Modernization Act (FSMA). Washington joined the existing regional centers in Colorado, Minnesota, New York, and Tennessee.

NEEDS ASSESSMENT

PH WINS FOR ALL

Regular national data collection specific to the public health workforce has been collected approximately every three years and jointly by the de Beaumont Foundation and the Association of State and Territorial Health Officials. In 2021, these entities expanded their data collection through a partnership with NWCPHP and the Region V Public Health Training Center in the upper mid-west. In so doing, the Public Health Workforce Interests and Needs Survey (PH WINS) went from a national sampling of state health departments and large local health departments to include a census survey of all state and local health departments in our two regions—including small, rural, understudied agencies. This pilot, termed PH WINS for All, provided additional data that have supported critical research regarding rural-specific workforce assets, needs, and challenges as well as provided additional data to guide workforce development activities in our Northwest states.

STUDENT STIPENDS

NWCPHP supports students working on a variety of projects in Alaska, Idaho, Oregon, and Washington. Proposals are evaluated based on public health practice focus, attention to underserved areas and populations, and feasibility. Eligible projects are funded up to \$3,500. Stipends are distributed directly to students to help defray living expenses during their hands-on learning experience.

NWCPHP FUNDING SOURCES

From 2020 to 2022, NWCPHP was funded by nine grants and twenty contracts. Grants came from several government organizations and foundations, while contracts came from state, local, and tribal health departments and organizations that requested NWCPHP's services or technical support. This data represents grants/contracts awarded in each year (including renewals); award amounts reflect total annual budgets inclusive of indirects.















WORKFORCE TRAINING SCHOLARSHIPS

NWCPHP supports professionals in Alaska, Idaho, Oregon, and Washington. These scholarships were provided to scholars in the Northwest Public Health & Primary Care Leadership Institute.



COVID-19 RESPONSE



NWCPHP was quick to equip public health professionals with resources in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. These resources covered a wide range of topics from vaccination hesitancy, communication strategies, legal issues, disease investigation, leadership, and addressing vulnerable and marginalized populations. Additional resources were gathered and provided by the University of Washington, Public Health Training Center Network, Public Health Foundation/ TRAIN, and State, Federal, and International Agencies. In addition to these valuable resources, NWCPHP also held nine Hot Topics in Practice webinars centering topics related to COVID-19, and with a focus on bringing public health academia and practice communities together, NWCPHP ensured the professionals in Region X and beyond had direct access to free and relevant materials during this surreal and chaotic time.
