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A. About the Ten Essential Services of Environmental Health

1. Monitor environmental and health status to identify and solve community environmental health problems

a. General Examples:

- A system to assess environmental health threats
- A system to track specific environmental health indicators
- A system to acquire community input
- Conducting community environmental health needs assessments
- A system to identify vulnerable populations
- A system to track trends in disease indicators

b. Specific examples:

An environmental health monitoring project in an Oregon county that has two components: developing an asthma tracking system and developing a tracking system to monitor, through GIS, burn permits and area of effect for burns.

2. Diagnose and investigate environmental health problems and health hazards in the community

a. General Examples:

- A protocol to collect, investigate and act upon complaints.
- A protocol to set in motion immediate action to abate imminent Public Health Hazards.
- Initiate action to correct Public Health Hazards.

- Coordinate an advisory committee made of community members to improve community involvement

- Review and update policies
- Develop new policies as needed to support public health initiatives.

- Advocate in the local government policies that affect environmental health

6. Enforce laws and regulations that protect environmental health and ensure safety

a. General Examples:

- Assure safe drinking water.
- Enforce tobacco smoke restrictions.
- Enforce the County and State Sanitary Code

7. Link people to needed personal environmental health services and assure the provision of healthcare when otherwise unavailable

a. General Examples:

- Collect information about other agencies to provide accurate and adequate referrals to the appropriate environmental agency.

- Maintain a website with web links to various relevant services and healthcare resources.
- Ensure that people obtain post-exposure rabies treatment.

b. Specific examples:

Deschutes County provides resources for the public regarding their rights as tenants in unsafe living conditions and other issues.

9. Evaluate effectiveness, accessibility and quality of personal and population based environmental health services

- Prepare quarterly performance measures reports.
- Choose indicators for projects and monitor regularly.
- Prepare Annual Environmental Health Report.
